Andrew Cuomo conceded New York City’s Democratic mayoral primary to self-described Democratic Socialist state Assemblyman Zohran Mamdani on Tuesday night.The race’s outcome will still be decided by a ranked-choice count but the 33-year-old front-runner remains in a commanding position.Tuesday night, Mamdani pulled ahead with more than an estimated 80% of ballots counted.**READ MORE:** Zohran Mamdani talks political policies, including tax proposal, rent freezesThe Democrat ran on an agenda for free buses, health care and more affordable housing which gained traction with voters.With victory all but assured, Mamdani told supporters, “I will be your Democratic nominee for the mayor of New York City.”“I will be the mayor for every New Yorker, whether you voted for me, for Governor Cuomo, or felt too disillusioned by a long-broken political system to vote at all,” he said. “I will work to be a mayor you will be proud to call your own.”Addressing supporters Wednesday morning, Assemblyman Mamdani said, “I will be your Democratic nominee for the mayor of New York City.”“We have won because New Yorkers have stood for a city that they can afford. A city where they can do more than just struggle,” said Mamdani.Cuomo was long considered the favorite throughout the race with his years of political experience, name recognition and fundraising efforts.Cuomo was looking to make a comeback after the 67-year-old resigned as governor after a sexual harassment scandal.While announcing he conceded the race, Cuomo told supporters that he called Mamdani to congratulate him.Cuomo, in a speech to his supporters, said Mamdani “won” and that “we are going to take a look and make some decisions.”“(Mamdani) put together a great campaign and he touched young people and inspired them and moved them and got them to come out and vote. And he really ran a highly impactful campaign.” Cuomo said at an event with supporters on Tuesday night.Cuomo, in a speech to supporters, said Mamdani “won” and that “we are going to take a look and make some decisions.”Mamdani would be the city’s first Muslim and Indian American mayor if elected.Even with Cuomo’s announcement, the race is set to proceed to a ranked-choice count since no candidate got more than 50%.Tuesday’s results do not yet reflect any ranked-choice tabulation. More comprehensive results won’t be reported until July 1, when the board of elections plans to run the ranked-choice tabulations.The primary winner will go on to face incumbent Mayor Eric Adams, a Democrat who decided to run as an independent amid a public uproar over his indictment on corruption charges and the subsequent abandonment of the case by Trump’s Justice Department.Speaking on “Fox News” on Wednesday morning, Adams seemed to laugh at Mamdani.“He’s a snake oil salesman, he will say and do anything to get elected,” he said. “I am looking forward to being on the campaign trail and showing New Yorkers we can’t go backwards.”Republican Curtis Sliwa, the founder of the Guardian Angels, will also be on the ballot in the fall’s general election.There is also a possibility that Cuomo will run on the November ballot as an independent candidate. Earlier, Cuomo’s campaign said he would run on a “Fight and Deliver” ballot line in the general election that he says is meant for voters disillusioned with the Democratic Party.More New York City Primary Election ResultsCopyright © 2025 WABC-TV. Buffalo Mayoral Primary and Special Elections >>> New York City Primary Overview and Results New York is the nation’s largest city, with an estimated population of 8.5 million residents living across the five boroughs. Primaries for city offices with more than two candidates use ranked choice voting. This lets voters rank multiple candidates in order of preference. If no candidate gets a majority of the vote, the ranked choice tabulation is conducted to determine a winner. On Tuesday, results will be available for first-choice votes. That may or may not be sufficient to project a winner. Where needed, the city Board of Elections will conduct a ranked choice tabulation on July 1. The seven-day delay allows for the receipt of mail-in ballots postmarked by Election Day, and also covers the window for individual voters to correct/cure any issues associated with their ballot. Polls close at 9:00 PM Eastern Time. Mayor Eric Adams is seeking a second term. Adams was indicted on federal corruption charges in September, 2024. It was the first federal indictment of a sitting NYC mayor in modern history. Those charges were dismissed in April. However, Adams chose to run for reelection as an independent after it became clear he would not be renominated as a Democrat. Adams will be on the November ballot along with the Democratic nominee from Tuesday’s primary and Republican Curtis Sliwa. Sliwa was the 2021 GOP nominee, losing by 67% to 28% to Adams. The frontrunners in the eleven-candidate field are former Gov. Andrew Cuomo and State Assemblyman Zohran Mamdani. Most polling has had Cuomo winning the nomination via the ranked choice tabulation, although a Monday poll release from Emerson College showed Mamdani prevailing. Cuomo is attempting a political comeback. He served as governor of New York from 2011 until he resigned in 2021 after the release of a report that he had sexually harassed numerous women. The much younger Mamdani - he is 33 - has represented an Assembly district in Queens since 2021. He identifies as a democratic socialist, and is campaigning on a very progressive platform, including free city buses and additional rent controls. He has also been an outspoken critic of Israel. Lakshya Jain, CEO of Split Ticket, calculated the polling average in the graphic below. It shows Cuomo with a 6.6% lead after the final ranked choice round. Given the large field, it is unlikely either candidate will receive a majority of the vote, necessitating the July 1 ranked choice tabulation. However, the first choice vote released Tuesday may provide some clues. Prediction Markets are giving Cuomo a roughly 50% chance of winning (as of publication time). Those odds changed significantly on Monday - Cuomo was previously seen as 80% likely to win - after the Emerson College poll release. While ranked choice adds some complexity, these markets often respond quickly as results come in, so we’ve included embeds for the odds of the two leading candidates. We will have results of select primaries for the following offices. Comptroller The Comptroller is the Chief Financial Officer of the City. Democrat Brad Lander is retiring to run for mayor. There are no candidates on the ballot. Justin Brennan, a member of the City Council Mark Levine, Manhattan Borough President Ismael Malave Perez Kevin Parker, a State Senator Brannan and Levine look to be the frontrunners. Parker was the incumbent for this same office in 2021. He received about 7% of the vote (in a field of ten) in the ranked choice tabulation round prior to his elimination. The winner will be a heavy favorite over the GOP nominee. Peter Kefalas and Daniel Maio are running in the party primary. Public Advocate The Public Advocate is the liaison between citizens and government. The office investigates complaints against city agencies. The incumbent is also first in the line of succession to the mayor. This role gained some visibility after Eric Adams was indicted, although the mayor has remained in office. Democrat Jumaane Williams is seeking a second term. He has drawn a strong challenge from State Assemblywoman Jenifer Rajkumar. Also on the ballot is Marty Dolan, a retired business executive. Dolan notably challenged Rep. Alexandria Ocasio-Cortez in the 2024 NY-14 Democratic primary, losing by 82% to 18%. Manhattan Borough President Each of the boroughs of New York City has a president. All of these offices are up for a four-year term in 2025. Incumbents are expected to be renominated and ultimately reelected in the four outer boroughs. The current Manhattan Borough President, Mark Levine, is a candidate for Comptroller. State Sen. Brad Hoylman-Sigal and City Councilman Keith Powers are the leading candidates to succeed him. Also on the ballot is Calvin Sun, a physician. No Republicans filed for this office. City Council District 2 Andrew Cuomo is not the only politician attempting a comeback Tuesday. Former U.S. Rep. Anthony Weiner is on the Democratic ballot for this lower Manhattan City Council seat. Carlina Rivera is ineligible to run due to term limits. As the AP reports, “Yes, that Weiner: The guy whose once-promising political career was derailed by sexting scandals and then seemingly ended forever when he was imprisoned for sending sexually explicit messages to a 15-year-old girl.” There are four other candidates on the ballot. Manhattan District Attorney While serving Manhattan, this is a state government office. As such, even if there were more than two candidates, ranked choice voting would not be used. Alvin Bragg is seeking a second term. He is being challenged by former Bronx prosecutor Patrick Timmins. The incumbent has had a notable first term, and seeks reelection as one of the most well-known district attorneys in the country. Andrew Cuomo and sending him to the general election.The Associated Press called the race after the results of the city’s ranked choice voting tabulation were released and showed Mamdani beating Cuomo by 12 percentage points.Mamdani’s win had been widely expected since he took a commanding lead after the polls closed a week ago, falling just short of the 50% of the vote needed to avoid another count under the city’s ranked choice voting model. The system allows voters’ other preferences to be counted if their top candidate falls out of the running.Mamdani, who declared victory the night of the June 24 primary, will face a general election field that includes incumbent Mayor Eric Adams as well as independent candidate Jim Walden and Republican Curtis Sliwa.Cuomo conceded defeat on the night of the June 24 primary but is contemplating whether to run in the general election on an independent ballot line.Mamdani, a 33-year-old democratic socialist and member of the state Assembly, was virtually unknown when he launched his candidacy centered on a bold slate of populist ideas. But he built an energetic campaign that ran circles around Cuomo as the older, more moderate Democrat tried to come back from the sexual harassment scandal that led to his resignation four years ago.The results, even before they were finalized, sent a shockwave through the political world.Mamdani’s campaign, which was focused on lowering the cost of living, claims it has found a new blueprint for Democrats who have at times appeared rudderless during President Donald Trump’s climb back to power.The Democratic establishment has approached Mamdani with caution. Many of its big players applauded his campaign but don’t seem ready to throw their full support behind the young progressive, whose past criticisms of law enforcement, use of the word “genocide” to describe the Israeli government’s actions in Gaza and “democratic socialist” label amount to landmines for some in the party.If elected, Mamdani would be the city’s first Muslim mayor and its first of Indian American descent. He would also be one of its youngest.For Republicans, Mamdani has already provided a new angle for attack. Trump and others in the GOP have begun to launch broadsides at him, moving to cast Mamdani as the epitome of leftist excess ahead of consequential elections elsewhere this year and next.“If I’m a Republican, I want this guy to win,” said Grant Reether, a political science professor at Syracuse University. “Because I want to be able to compare and contrast my campaign as a Republican, in a national election, to the idea of, ‘This is where the Democratic party is.’“New York City’s ranked choice voting model allows voters to list up to five candidates on their ballots in order of preference. If a single candidate is the first choice of more than 50% of voters, then that person wins the race outright. Since no candidate cleared that bar on the night of the primary, the ranked choice voting process kicked in. The board is scheduled to certify the election on July 15.Mamdani has been a member of the state Assembly since 2021, and has characterized his inexperience as a potential asset. His campaign promised free city buses, free child care, a rent freeze for people living in rent-stabilized apartments, government-run grocery stores and more, all paid for with taxes on the wealthy. Critics have slammed his agenda as politically unrealistic.Cuomo ran a campaign centered on his extensive experience, casting himself as the only candidate capable of saving a city he said had spun out of control. During the campaign, he focused heavily on combating antisemitism and leaned on his name recognition and juggernaut fundraising operation rather than mingling with voters. I called him. I congratulated him. I applauded him sincerely for his effort.” “Tonight, we made history,” Mamdani later said to a crowd of his supporters as he claimed victory. “In the words of Nelson Mandela, ‘It always seems impossible until it is done.’ My friends, we have done it. I will be your Democratic nominee for the mayor of New York City.”CBS News estimated a turnout of 1.1 million primary election voters, with most voting in person on Election Day. That’s more than a third of registered Democrats in the city, and a noticeably higher turnout than the 2021 primary. Since no candidate crossed the 50% threshold on primary night, ranked choice voting rounds were required. The candidate with the least amount of votes was eliminated, and then the voters who ranked that candidate as their first choice had their second choices counted, and so on. Those ranked choice voting rounds continued until one candidate exceeded 50% of the vote. Now on to November general electionCuomo previously announced he would run on both the Democratic and independent tickets so he could be on the ballot for the November general election, whether he won the primary or not. He spoke with CBS News New York’s political reporter Marcia Kramer last week and said he was still weighing his options. “We’re going to be looking at the numbers that come in from the primary, and then we have to look at the landscape in the general election, which is a totally different landscape,” Cuomo said in their exclusive interview. Mamdani and Cuomo will face Mayor Eric Adams, who is running as an independent, Republican Curtis Sliwa, and Jim Walden, a former prosecutor also running as an independent. While all eyes were on the mayoral election, it wasn’t the only race that voters weighed in on. They also ranked their choices for New York City public advocate, comptroller, Manhattan district attorney, as well as Manhattan, Brooklyn and Bronx borough presidents, among other races.Check below for the results as we know them so far in the primary elections.
